MANDATORY CLASS FOR ALL FIRST-TIME PILLAR STUDENTS

CHRISTIAN SELF-GOVERNMENT THURS. SEPT. 3, 7:00 - 9:00pm –OR– SAT. SEPT. 12, 10:00am - 12:00noon **ALL NEW STUDENTS & PARENTS**
Individual self-government is the essential foundation for all levels of liberty-based government – local, state, and national. This was recognized by our Founding Fathers as the necessary basis for the decentralized and limited form of government they established. It is learned in the family and practiced in public. Pillar students are expected to understand and practice individual Christian self-government, and as such, **ALL FIRST-TIME STUDENTS AND PARENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND THIS 2-HOUR CLASS.**

FULL YEAR COURSES

Annual Core Classes

WORLDVIEW FOUNDATIONS WED. 11:30 - 1:30, SEPT. 9 - MAY 12 — INSTRUCTOR: DANIEL HITE **9th-12th GRADE**
This course is unique to The Pillar Foundation and is a must for every American student. It will lay a solid foundation for a consistent Christian worldview in all academic disciplines as well as promote our Christian civic responsibility as American citizens. *WVF* will examine the essentials of absolute truth, the reliability of the Scriptures, origins, purpose, and other theological and philosophical roots that are necessary for a Biblical worldview. The Christian worldview will be compared and contrasted with other worldviews prevalent in American culture today – Marxism/Socialism, Secular Humanism, Islam, New Spirituality, and Postmodernism. This study will also examine various disciplines rooted in law and government, science and education, and the arts and media. This course will sharpen critical evaluation skills as well as promote the expression of individual Christian self-government in the home, church, civil arena, and society.

AMERICAN HISTORY: AMERICA'S CHRISTIAN HERITAGE TUES. 10:00 - 12:00, SEPT. 8 - MAY 11 — INSTRUCTOR: DANIEL HITE **10th-12th GRADE**
This course is unique to The Pillar Foundation and is a must for every American student. Every American Christian needs to know the true nature and extent of America's Christian heritage. It is God who made nations and appointed their historical times and boundaries (Acts 17:26). We are commanded in Scripture to remember the great things the Lord our God has done. "In God We Trust," though not always official, has always been America's motto. Based on primary source documentation, students will study the heritage of our nation as one wrought in the struggle to find and defend truth, liberty, and justice. We will trace the development of civil liberty in world history, through the Reformation, and its subsequent establishment and development in America. We will see the providential hand of God in our history, the spiritual roots of our liberty, as well as the duty to understand, appreciate, and defend it. This course will continue to trace America's decline through the 20th and into the 21st Century – exchanging exceptionalism for pragmatism, republicanism for progressivism, and theism for humanism in its many forms. The restoration of America begins with knowing our providential history and heritage, and praying for spiritual awakening.

PRE-ALGEBRA THURS. 10:00 - 12:00, SEPT. 10 - MAY 13 — INSTRUCTOR: SHIRLEY MORRIS **8th GRADE**
Pre-Algebra is a standard 8th grade or honors 7th grade math course. The main concepts covered will be positive and negative integers, graphing on the coordinate plane, solving multi-step equations with variables, and writing equations for word problems. I will grade the assignments at first, but as the year progresses, I may supply answer sheets and ask parents to grade some assignments. In the first few lessons, students will be required to use basic arithmetic skills without calculators, but when the lessons get more advanced, I will allow calculators. The textbook to be used is Bob Jones Pre-Algebra (2nd edition). **PREREQUISITE: Students must pass a pretest.**

ALGEBRA 1 MON. 11:30 - 1:30, SEPT. 14 - MAY 10 — INSTRUCTOR: DARLENE FALLON **8th-12th GRADE**
A typical Algebra 1 class is 8th grade or higher. Using Saxon Algebra 1 (3rd edition) textbook, we will cover signed numbers, order of operations, algebraic expressions, areas, surface area, volume, exponents and roots, fractional parts of numbers, ratios, graphs of linear equations, finite and infinite sets, factoring, probability and scientific notation. Four lessons will be taught each class period, and students are required to complete given assignments at home and bring them to class. **PREREQUISITE:** Completion of Pre-Algebra, knowledge of all addition, subtraction, multiplication and division facts up to 12s, and the ability to multiply/divide multi-digit and decimal numbers along with a basic understanding of fractions. **Students must pass a pretest.**

ALGEBRA 2 THURS. 1:00 - 3:00, SEPT. 10 - MAY 13 — INSTRUCTOR: SHIRLEY MORRIS **9th-12th GRADE**
As a continuation of Algebra 1, Algebra 2 will review solving simple linear equations and simultaneous equations and graphing linear and simple quadratic equations. In addition, we will solve proportions, graph quadratic and exponential equations, simplify radicals, and solve radical equations. Also addressed will be negative exponents and some geometric functions like angles, perimeters and proportional segments. The textbook to be used is Bob Jones Algebra 2 (3rd edition). **PREREQUISITE:** Algebra 1 and **students must pass a pretest.**

PHYSICS MON. 9:30 - 11:30, SEPT. 14 - MAY 10 — INSTRUCTOR: RUSTY MYERS **11th-12th GRADE**
Using Apologia *Exploring Creation with Physics, 2nd Edition*, topics covered will include: Newtonian Motion, Waves and Light, Electricity and Magnetism, and Nuclear Physics (if time allows). Students will be required to turn in a research paper at the end of each semester. **PREREQUISITE:** Algebra 1

BIOLOGY WED. 10:00 - 12:00, SEPT. 9 - APR. 21 — INSTRUCTOR: BOB KIRKWOOD **9th-12th GRADE**
This course offers hands-on learning in cellular biology (microscope use) and anatomy/physiology (dissection of animals). The student will learn how science reveals the wonderment of God's creative hand; for example – the embryonic fetal development of the human and the symbiotic relationship of nature to man. There will be critical thinking skills designed to help the student develop higher thinking skills. **Lab Fee: \$30 per student**

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE (ASL) TUES. 12:00 - 1:30, SEPT. 8 - MAY 11 — INSTRUCTOR: AMBER SOBERY **9th-12th GRADE**
This year-long course in American Sign Language (ASL) introduces students to the language and culture of Deaf people in the United States and Canada. This course will focus on receptive and expressive language skills along with Deaf culture, community, art, literature, and history. Students are required to attend and participate during class using a comprehensible input model that focuses on understanding first and signing as understanding grows. Students should expect 5-10 minutes of daily practice of vocabulary, fingerspelling, and numbers in addition to 60-90 minutes of written homework and receptive language videos weekly. In order to demonstrate ability in signing skills, students will be asked to record videos of themselves signing to submit to the instructor throughout the year for individual progress tracking. Internet access is required for the completion of weekly "at home" assignments. This is a good class for those who are interested in studying sign language as a world language, want to be involved in ministry to the deaf in their church or community, or just want to learn something new.

FULL YEAR COURSES (cont'd.)

GETTING INTO GREEK

TUES. 2:00 - 3:30, SEPT. 8 – MAY 4 — INSTRUCTOR: LEAH HITE

9th GRADE-ADULT

This course is for those who don't have time to take full Greek but would like a Greek primer. Using syntax and grammar rules together with Greek interlinear references, you will become familiar with the tools needed to translate the original New Testament language without the memorization of Greek vocabulary. By the end of the year, we will have translated the epistle of 1 John, and you will have a reference notebook to use for years to come. **ADULTS ARE WELCOME!**

MUSICAL THEATER

WED. 2:00 - 5:00, SEPT. 9 - DEC. 16 (Spring Production) FRI. 2:00 – 4:00, OCT. 10 – DEC. 4 (Christmas Production)

WED. & FRI. 2:00 - 5:00, JAN. 6 - MAR. 12 (Spring Production) — INSTRUCTORS: JILL FLETCHER & KATHY SIDE

9th-12th GRADE

This course's classes are considered rehearsals for Take 3 Christian Theater's Christmas and Spring productions whose goals are to educate, edify, and entertain to glorify God. To register for MUSICAL THEATER means to register for an audition. An audition is required for acceptance as a cast member for Take 3's 2026 Christmas and/or 2027 spring production. There is a limited number of audition slots and a limited number of cast members accepted. Rehearsals will be uniquely structured according to the rehearsal needs. Additional attendance is required for dress rehearsals and performances for both musicals. The Christmas rehearsals will conclude after the cast member's final production(s). Production expenses will be shared by individual cast members (not to exceed \$200 per cast member). Note: 8th graders may audition for provisional consideration. 1st SEMESTER COURSES

CONSUMER MATH

MON. 11:40 - 1:00, SEPT. 14 – DEC. 14 — INSTRUCTOR: RUSTY MYERS

9th-12th GRADE

Consumer Math is a practical mathematics course designed to equip students with the numerical and decision-making skills necessary for responsible Christian living in today's economic world. The course emphasizes real-life financial literacy while integrating biblical principles of stewardship, honesty, diligence, and generosity. Students will learn how to apply mathematics to everyday financial situations such as budgeting, banking, taxes, credit, insurance, investing, home and automobile purchases, and consumer decision-making. Special attention is given to understanding interest, loans, savings, and the long-term effects of financial choices. Textbook: *Bob Jones University – Consumer Math, 2nd Edition*. Class requirements: Algebra 1 completed or concurrently enrolled.

INCREASING PERSONAL EFFECTIVENESS

10 WEEKS - MON. 2:00 - 4:00, SEPT. 14 – NOV. 16 — INSTRUCTOR: LARRY DARBY

9th-12th GRADE

Personal Effectiveness is the ability to reach YOUR goals with minimal frustration. These goals may be career, relationship and/or ministry. In this 10-week course, you will learn and practice some of the most important skills (and attitudes) that lead to greater personal effectiveness. In other words, you will increase your ability to reach YOUR life goals. Topics include: what are effective goals; the art of affirmation; conversation skills; active listening; non-verbal communication; conflict resolution; positive attitude; taking initiative; perseverance; time management. Every week there will be mandatory homework (30-60 minutes) along with a goal-setting exercise. In order to be considered for the class, students should read this course description and write three complete sentences on "Why I want to take Increasing Personal Effectiveness." CHRISTIAN CLASSIC LIT: DEVELOPING GODLY CHARACTER

TUES. 10:00 - 11:30, SEPT. 8 - DEC. 15 — INSTR: CATHY RUCHE

9th-12th GRADE

This course will focus on the interpretation and application of classic Lamplighter literature. During the semester, students will read and discuss these creative, 19th-Century stories woven with Biblical truths that cultivate Christlike character in attitudes, self-image, and relationships. We will evaluate character strengths and weaknesses, handling adversity and challenges, and discerning good and evil, truth and justice, and personal priorities. Students will also participate in weekly discussion, take comprehension quizzes, and will be encouraged to apply in their own lives the Christian virtues modeled in each story. **Different books will be studied each semester.**

APPLIED APOLOGETICS

TUES. 2:00 - 4:00, SEPT. 8 - DEC. 15 — INSTR: ED BOWEN

9th-12th GRADE

Why is Christianity true? How do I answer common objections to the Christian faith? How can I be an effective communicator? This very focused and practical apologetics course will instruct students on how to start and guide more spiritual conversations in their sphere of influence. Students will be guided in understanding the basics of the simple Gospel message in 1 Corinthians 15 and their role in sharing the Gospel and also addressing personal questions and fears. Applying the Gospel message to today's challenging culture, this course will coach teens on how to relate to their audience, show care, and how to use questions to guide conversations. This class is an opportunity to help any student make the faith of their family or their church their very own.

RIISING ABOVE CULTURAL MIEDIOCRITY

WED. 10:00 - 11:30, SEPT. 9 - DEC. 16 — INSTRUCTOR: JIM HANCOCK

9th-12th GRADE

An in-depth book study and question-guided discussion class through two excellent books: *Do Hard Things* by Alex & Brett Harris, and *The Third Alternative* by Bill Burnett. This study will help students recognize their unique potential for excellence and impact in a culture that underrates teenagers, and will emphasize the value of embracing responsibility and developing Christian self-government. Through open discussion, students will uncover their own personal strengths and convictions, as well as confront areas of compromise, disorder, and fear. Students will also look at ways to develop character, direction, and a principle-based life in an unprincipled society. SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES FOR THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

THUR. 10:00 - 11:00, SEPT. 10 - DEC. 3 — INSTRUCTOR: JIM HANCOCK

9th-12th GRADE

In this 12-week class, students will study and discuss the nature and value of personal and corporate spiritual disciplines as a means of pursuing godliness. Some specific disciplines include Bible study, prayer, worship, evangelism, service, solitude, and journaling. Homework each week will require an hour or two of reading and some follow-up questions from the book's study guide. Our class time will be spent discussing the assigned topic and sharing personal insights and practical application.

GENESIS 101: UNDERSTANDING CREATION, THE FLOOD, AND BABEL MON. 9:30 - 11:00, JAN. 4 - MAY 10 — VARIOUS INSTRUCTORS **9th-12th GRADE**

This is a survey course taught by members of the Missouri Association for Creation. From a Biblical worldview, *Genesis 101* will examine the creation vs. evolution controversy from the authority of the Word of God. It will address a young earth, the worldwide flood of Noah's day, animal "evolution," fossil evidence, dinosaurs, races and genetics, as well as a Biblically consistent and coherent view of other related sciences. This course will equip the student with a basic Christian apologetic for our origins, an understanding of how to evaluate scientific evidence, and a deeper commitment to the authority of Scripture from the very first verse.

WESTERN CIVILIZATION MON. 11:40 - 1:30, JAN. 4 - MAY 10 — INSTRUCTOR: RUSTY MYERS **9th-12th GRADE**

Western Civilization is a survey course that examines the development of Western culture, institutions, and ideas from the ancient world to the modern era through the lens of a Christian worldview. The course explores how biblical thought and Christianity shaped the political, intellectual, moral, and cultural foundations of Western society. Beginning with the civilizations of the ancient Near East, Greece, and Rome, students will study the historical setting in which Christianity emerged. The course then traces the growth of the early church, the transformation of the Roman world, and the formation of medieval Christendom. Special attention is given to the influence of Christian theology on law, education, science, art, government, and social institutions. Textbook: Your Bible and class hand-outs. No prerequisites.

U.S. CONSTITUTION & GOVERNMENT MON. 1:30 - 3:30, JAN. 4 - MAY 10 — INSTRUCTOR: DANIEL HITE **9th-12th GRADE**

This course will lead the student into a study of the U.S. Constitution and the principles and patterns of American government. We will discover the tapestry of American exceptionalism woven by the framers and superintended by the hand of Divine Providence. Using Rick Green's and David Barton's fast-paced video curriculum, *Constitution Alive!*, students will also read founding-era primary documents: the U.S. Constitution line-by-line, the Declaration of Independence, Federalist (and "Anti-Federalist") Papers, as well as other supporting historical documentation. We will examine the principles of liberty and the personal and political process by which our liberty is maintained. This course will require weekly class discussion and assignments, quizzes, and tests. It will equip students to understand and articulate our God-given rights and responsibilities, our civic duty, and the Godly principles which sustain and protect these liberties.

CHRISTIAN CLASSIC LIT: DEVELOPING GODLY CHARACTER TUES. 10:00 - 11:30, JAN. 5 - MAY 11 — INSTR: CATHY RUCHE **9th-12th GRADE**

This course will focus on the interpretation and application of classic Lamplighter literature. During the semester, students will read and discuss these creative, 19th-Century stories woven with Biblical truths that cultivate Christlike character in attitudes, self-image, and relationships. We will evaluate character strengths and weaknesses, handling adversity and challenges, and discerning good and evil, truth and justice, and personal priorities. Students will also participate in weekly discussion, take comprehension quizzes, and will be encouraged to apply in their own lives the Christian virtues modeled in each story. **Different books will be studied each semester.**

APPLIED APOLOGETICS 2 TUES. 2:00 - 4:00, JAN. 5 - MAY 11 — INSTRUCTOR: ED BOWEN **9th-12th GRADE**

Picking up on the themes of Apologetics 1, this course provides a more robust positive case for the truth claims of Christianity. Where the first semester concentrates on **how** one delivers the truth of the Gospel, this class commits to helping students understand **why** it is true. Starting from a Classical Apologetic framework, the students will learn how to defend 4 major themes from a Christian worldview: Truth, God, the Bible, and Jesus. The content is accessible, concentrates on key arguments and concepts, and presents ideas in an orderly manner with each defense building on the last. It is slide-driven accessing the visual learner as well. Mr. Bowen has a way of making complicated arguments clear and understandable and therefore useful in emboldening one's confidence in the Christian Worldview Truth Claims and its Values. **PREREQUISITE:** Completion of an apologetics course at Pillar anytime during the last two years.

AMERICAN LIBERTY: PAST AND PRESENT THURS. 10:00 - 12:00, JAN. 7 - MAY 13 — INSTRUCTOR: NANCY SANDER **9th-12th GRADE**

America's founding was called The Great American Experiment – something no other country in recorded human history had ever tried. The result? The freest, most prosperous nation the world had ever seen. What was the recipe for America's success? Come learn the foundational principles of America on display in the Monument to the Forefathers in Plymouth, Massachusetts. We will learn the principles on which our nation was built and see how those principles played out in our nation's history, government, and culture. The textbook *Monumental: Restoring America as the Land of Liberty* by Stephen McDowell will accompany a series of video discussions between the author and Kirk Cameron from the documentary film *Monumental*. There will be weekly reading and writing assignments along with class discussion.

ETIQUETTE THURS. 2:00 - 4:00, JAN. 7 - MAY 13 — INSTRUCTOR: VICKIE WELLER **MINIMUM AGE 14 by September 1 & IN HIGH SCHOOL**

An important component of a college prep home education is to develop social skills that promote confidence, character, and leadership while glorifying God. The Etiquette class will be an interactive and participatory classroom where principles and the practical application of etiquette will be presented, discussed and practiced. Students are encouraged to step out of their comfort zones to practice and further develop their etiquette skills to help others to feel comfortable and valued, all the while not compromising their own moral beliefs. During this semester course, students will learn many skills including: warm introductions, the art of conversation – including listening skills and body language, written correspondence, classroom etiquette, personal presentation, scholarship and job interviewing, work manners, technology etiquette – including social media and cell phone use, illness and disability etiquette, etiquette while attending the symphony - theatre - conferences, citizenship etiquette, home and community manners, hospitality, dance etiquette, wedding etiquette, funeral etiquette, etiquette of a gentleman/lady, and dining etiquette. Some expenses incurred include a casual luncheon and a semi-formal dinner which all students are required to attend. Please pay an \$80 per student fee by December 3, 2026. Homework: Only some weeks have required assignments outside of class to enhance the student's learning experience – not many and nothing difficult. **Auditing the class is not an option.**
